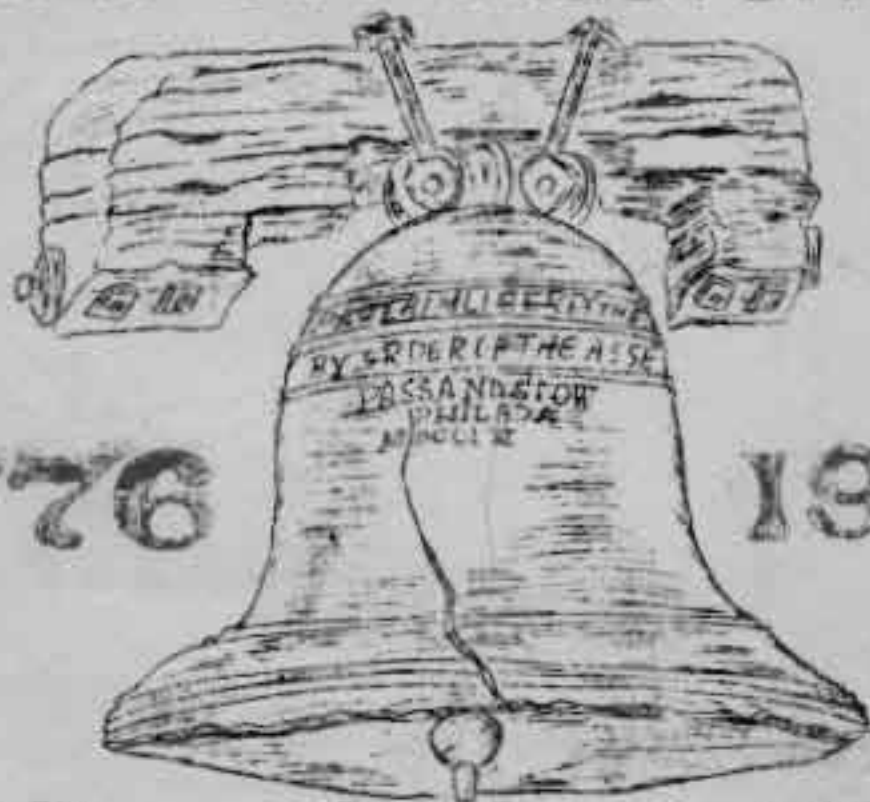

Over two thirds of the world has lined up in support of the United Nation's decision to aid the South Korean Republic in its defense against the unprovoked attack by Communists from North Korea. This support has been given in the most concrete form possible - actual combat missions against the aggressor - in addition to assistance in the form of supplies for the South Korean Army.

Latest dispatches from the scene in Korea state that American troops have landed in Korea, and are being rapidly deployed against the Red invaders. Maj. Gen. William H. Dean is in command of the American troops in Korea.

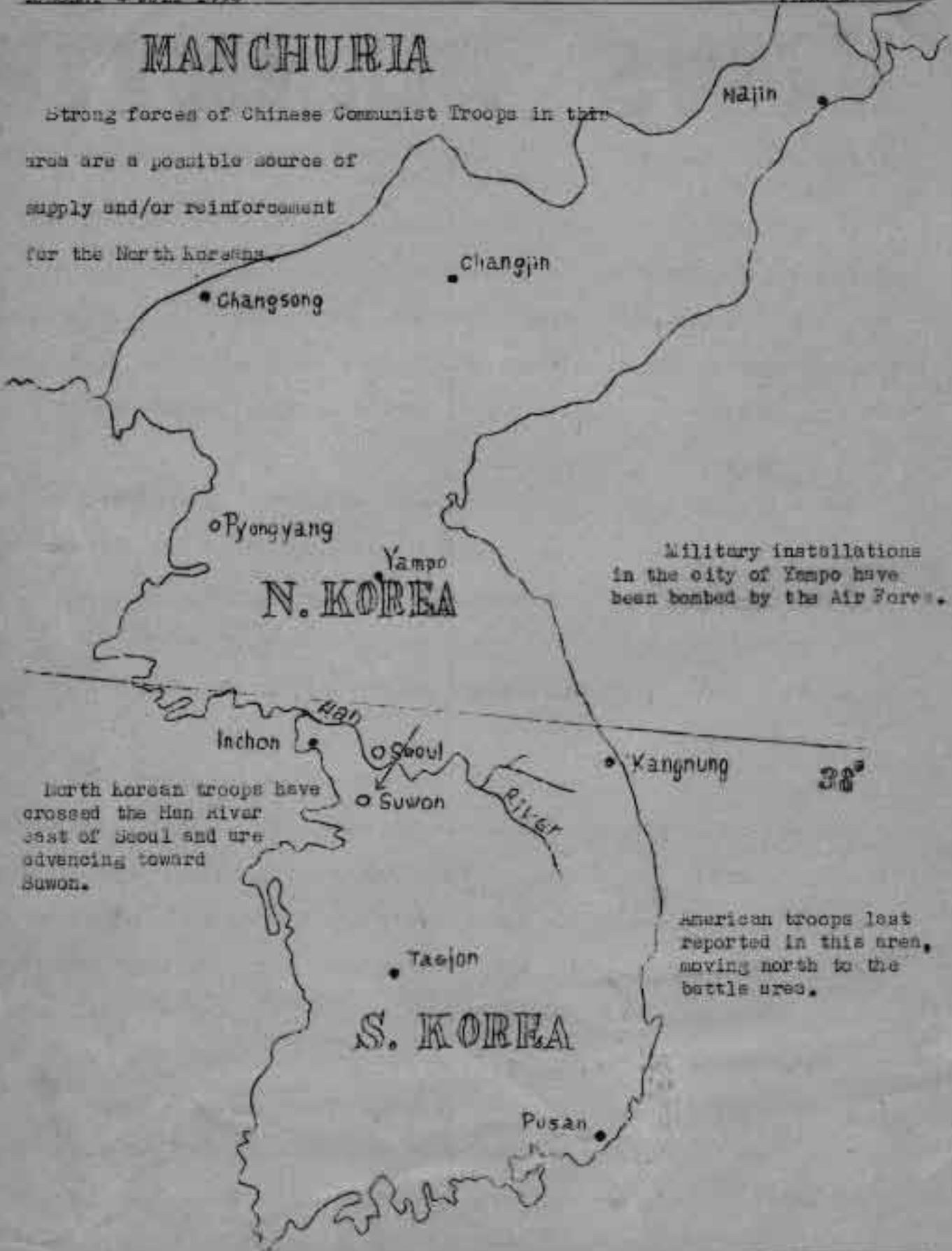
The American and British Navies have imposed a blockade on North Korea, and in its first test a joint American-British Naval Force sank five of six North Korean Torpedo Boats.

The American Air Force has been in operation against the invading force for many days. Latest dispatches state that the bombing planes are meeting little opposition and are able to approach their targets at altitudes as low as 3000 feet. Two North Korean planes were reported shot down by American fighters in Sunday's fighting. Military installations in the city of Yampo about 150 miles north of Seoul, were bombed in action against the supply lines of the invaders. Sorties by the Air force over Northern Korea resulted in damage to bridges, supply depots, troop concentrations, ammunition dumps, etc.

The battle line at last reports was still situated north of Suwon. Ten North Koreans were reported to have a few tanks across the Han River. American troops at last report were somewhere north of Taegon enroute to the battle.

MANCHURIA

Strong forces of Chinese Communist Troops in this area are a possible source of supply and/or reinforcement for the North Koreans.



Military installations in the city of Yampo have been bombed by the Air Force.

North Korean troops have crossed the Han River east of Seoul and are advancing toward Suwon.

American troops last reported in this area, moving north to the battle area.
