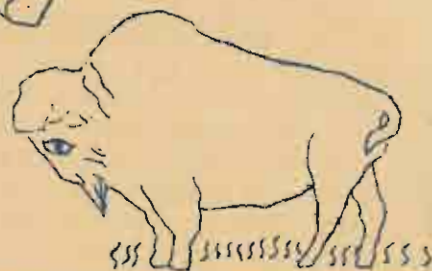
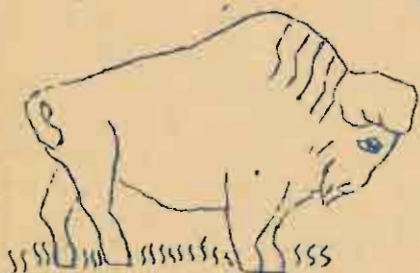

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Korea

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In Korea

Chinese Communists haven't tried to attack UN troops on Korea's 'Bunker Hill' since early Tuesday morning. An Allied officer reported that UN troops have sighted some Reds but the enemy has shied away from the western front peak. Anywhere from two companies to a full battalion of Red infantrymen assaulted the peak Monday night and Tuesday morning but were driven off after heavy fighting.

Bad weather grounded most Fifth Air Force planes Tuesday. A few fighter-bombers, however, managed to take to the air to bomb Red installations along the front.

NEW JET RECORD

A British jet-bomber has crossed the Atlantic Ocean twice in 10 hours. The Canberra Jet left northern Ireland Tuesday night, arrived in Gander, Newfoundland. Four hours later and after a two hour stop-over for re-fueling, crossed the Atlantic again in four hours. The plane, which can fly at more than 600 miles-an-hour averaged around 530 miles-an-hour on the trans-Atlantic round-trip. Actual flying time was seven hours and fifty-nine minutes.

Panmunjom Bulletin

Armistice negotiators met again yesterday morning at Panmunjom. The meeting lasted 33 minutes. When it became apparent that the Reds had nothing new to offer on the prisoner repatriation issue, the UN command asked and received another week's recess in the talks.

VET RETURNS

Almost a year of war service in Korea was not enough to discourage combat veteran Cpl. Lee Sepulvado from reenlisting in the Army to come back to the Far East Command.

The 24-year-old 'How' Company machine gunner found himself back in the same company of the same regiment in which he served during his first tour of duty in Korea.

Sepulvado joined the 17th while it was on maneuvers in Japan in August of 1950. After the commitment of the BUFFALOES to the Korean campaign, Lee participated in the Inchon landing, the push to the Yalu River, and other major campaigns. In May, 1951 he rotated to the States, where he was extended for a year.

Following discharge, Cpl. Sepulvado remained a civilian only 34 days. Reenlisting, he specifically asked for assignment to the BUFFALO Regiment. He was ordered to his old company purely by accident.

Pleased by the coincidence, Sepulvado says, 'things are much different now, and of course there are many new faces in the company. But, it's good to be back with my old outfit.'

A long and colorful parade advanced along New York's Fifth Avenue yesterday morning. Marching along side the former Buck Private and Lieutenant was former five star General Dwight Eisenhower, a Legionnaire from Abilene, Kansas. For many a Legionnaire attending the 34th annual convention, the 12-hour parade was the emotional high point of the gathering.

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Late News

A Navy mine-layer has picked up two members of an ill-fated B-17 that went down in the Gulf of Mexico Tuesday. Meanwhile, planes and ships of the Navy, Coast Guard and Air Force are searching the stormy, shark-infested waters for six crewmen who are still missing. The Flying Fortress was shot down in flames accidentally during a test flight of a new model F-85D Sabre Jet. The pilot of the jet mistook the B-17 for an un-manned target plane.

Police yesterday nabbed the author of Tuesday's Brinks robbery in Washington, D.C. A former employee of the company, Ray Farmer, has confessed to walking off with \$65,000 while four guards were having lunch. The money was hidden in the woods outside of the nation's capital. The 26-year-old thief had been working for Brinks driving a truck on the same route from which he grabbed the money. He was fired for having been associated with a teenage gang.

Texas Governor Allan Shivers and Price Daniel, the Democratic nominee for the Senate, yesterday continued their feud with Adlai Stevenson over the tideland oil dispute. Both Democrats continued to voice their opposition to Stevenson's endorsement of federal ownership of the tidelands, which may mean a Texas jump into the Republican column in November.

President Truman yesterday named Tighe Wood, now the nation's Rent-Controller, to be head of the office of Price Stabilization. Woods will succeed Ellis Arnall in the price post on September 1st.

SPORTS

Leo Durocher's second place New York Giants banged out 16 hits Tuesday to beat the last place Pittsburgh Pirates 14-7. The Giants climaxed their scoring with six runs in the eighth inning. The winning pitcher was Art Wilhelm while Murray Dickson got the lossy. Lefty Warren Spahn pitched five-hit ball Tuesday to give the Boston Braves a 2-0 shutout over the Cincinnati Reds. The victory put Boston in sixth place and dropped the Redlegs to seventh. Bud Podbielan was the losing hurler.

Doc Fony's one-out single on a 3-2 pitch off Andy Hansen gave the Chicago Cubs a 3-2 victory over the Philadelphia Phils in a 13 inning game. The contest consumed 3 hours and 23 minutes.

Hank Sauer sent the game into overtime with a two-run double in the ninth inning.

Joe Collins clouted a two-out, three-run homer off Satchel Paige in the ninth inning Tuesday to give the American League's front running Yankees a 6-3 victory over the St. Louis Browns. The win went to Bob Kuzava.

Berny McCosky's pinch-hit triple in the 11th inning was the payoff blow in a three-run rally Tuesday that gave the Cleveland Indians a 6-3 win over the Philadelphia Athletics and kept the Tribe hot on the heels of the first place New York Yankees. The victory went to Lou Brissie in relief while Bob Hodger drew the defeat.

The Indians now trail the Bronx Bombers by one full game.

The Boston Red Sox remained 3½ games to the rear of the Yanks as they easily defeated the last place Detroit Tigers 11-3. Sid Hudson coasted to the win as the Sox pounded out 10 hits to beat Bill Wight, former Red Soxer. The only homer came off the bat of the Tiger first baseman Walt Dropo.
