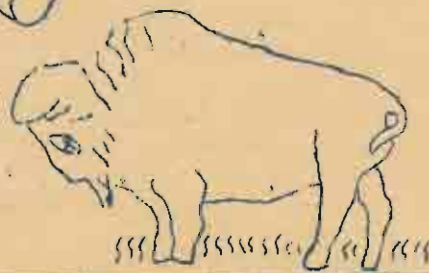

In Korea

Allied war planes took advantage of the first decent weather in five days Wednesday to sweep North Korea with powerful blows. Fifth Air Force planes Wednesday included 25 troop bunkers and two artillery positions destroyed.

On the ground, a raiding party of Allied infantrymen took on a Red platoon in a 3½ hour fire-fight. Seventeen of the enemy were believed killed in the battle west of the Pukhan River.

The British Deputy Chief of Staff to the UN command in Tokyo arrived there yesterday morning. Maj. Gen. Steven Shoosmith will serve under General Mark Clark.

POLITICAL NEWS

Adlai Stevenson stood before the American Legion Tuesday and said he wouldn't let pressure groups, including veterans, influence him if elected.

The Democratic presidential nominee received an ovation that sounded as enthusiastic and lasted as long as the reception given Dwight Eisenhower two days ago.

The governor said he would resist pressures from all organized groups, including the American Legion. He pointed out that nearly everyone in the United States is now either a veteran or a relative of one, and any special privileges asked for by veterans would have to be paid for by the veterans themselves.

WHAT A MESS!

In the American League, the New York Yankees moved two games in front as they defeated the St. Louis Browns and the second place Cleveland Indians bowed to the Philadelphia Athletics.

In the Yankee-Bronx tilt, Yogi Berra was the whole show as he belted a pair of homeruns, drove in four runs and scored four tallies himself to lead the Bronx Bombers to a 12-7 victory over the Browns. Ray Scarborough received the pitching win while Gene Bearden was charged with the loss.

Lefthander Alex Kellner survived a wild first inning in which he walked three and had an ordinary single go for an inside-the-park homerun to defeat the Indians and Mike Garcia 6-5. Kellner gave the Tribe only four hits.

The Boston Red Sox exploded for a five-run third inning against Dave Madison of the De-

troit Tigers to down the Bengals 5-0. Lefty McL Parnell held the last place Tigers to six hits as the Bosox extended their winning streak to five games. They trail the Yanks by 3½ games.

The Chicago Cubs exploded for 15 hits Wednesday to defeat the league leading Brooklyn Dodgers 10-5, in the opener of a three-game series. Bob Rush, aided by ninth inning help from 42-year-old Dutch Leonard, gained his 13th victory of the year. Brooklyn starter and loser Joe Landrum was knocked out of the box in the second inning when the Bruins pushed across five runs. The loss snapped the Bums' winning streak at five games.

Shortstop Al Dark banged out three hits and scored two runs to pace the New York Giants to 5-4 win over the lowly Pittsburgh Pirates. Giant winner Paul Connolly held the Bucs to four hits. Monte Irvin hit his first homerun since returning to the Giant lineup. George Metkovich belted a round-tripper for the Pirates. The Giants now trail the Dodgers by 9½ games.

In a night contest, the Chicago White Sox used four pitchers to defeat the Washington Senators 4-1.
