## BUFFALOES TAKE OPENER 9-5

The home run ball proved to be the payoff blow for the BUFFALOES yesterday as they moved one game up on the Polar Bears in the 7th Division Baseball Series, winning 9-5. The big right arm of Les Mlinarick held the Bears in check as he went all the way for his sixth victory of the season.

The BUFFALOES wasted little time in getting to Polar Bear hurler Tom Kerr. Fred Bernard started the contest for the BUFFS by doubling to center field which was followed by a walk to Milt Gaudet. ### Discharges To Take Half

Secretary of the Army Frank Pace said rotation troops from Korea and scheduled discharges in the next months will strain every nerve of the Army.

The Army Secretary said the Army will discharge more than 750,000 of its 1,500,000 men by next June 30th. 'This means, he said, 'the Army will be turned into a gigantic training base, fighting to hold combat readiness but pressed in every sector for training replacements.'

Pace said in the future the Army must move swiftly by air in large numbers. The Army is now experimenting with a converti-plane which rises like a helicopter and flies like a plane. Antitank weapons, says the secretary, have been immeasurably improved and the new medium tank is the finest in the world. He also added that the potential of the atom will be added to the Army's firepower in the future in the form of guided missiles and artillery.
