BUFFALOES BOW 11-6

Behind the eight-hit pitching of Murray Kleinfield, the 31st Polar Bears defeated the BUFFALOES 11-6 yesterday to bring the 7th Division 'Little World Series' into a deadlock. Each team has one game. In Korea

Military targets in the Red Korean capital of Pyongyang are in smoking ruins today. Forty-three selected military installations have been hit by 1400 sorties by planes from land and carrier bases. The three-wave attack lasted more than eight hours Friday. Red MIG's tried to halt the attack but were driven back by Sabre Jets and Meteor flying cover for the fighter-bombers. At last word radio Pyongyang was still off the air. The combined Allied air armada dropped more than 697 tons of bombs and fired more than 62,000 rounds of ammunition into the Red capital. Incomplete claims from returning pilots show 57 Red buildings destroyed and 44 damaged. Complete results of the attack could not be observed because of dense clouds of smoke hanging over the city.

The Polar Bears took advantage of seven BUFFALO miscalculations to extend the series to the final game today at 1400 hours at the Bears home grounds.

First baseman Oddo and Kleinfield led the 31st hitting spree with three hits each while McGee, Tubbs and Lezano collected two apiece for the Bisons.

REARMAMENT SEEN

America's high commissioner in Germany predicts Western nations will clear the way early in the fall for German rearmament. Commissioner Walter Connelly predicts the French and West German parliaments will quickly ratify the European army treaty and the West German peace contract. Ratification of these facts would permit the Germans to start recruiting 500,000 men as their contribution to the six-nation European army.

The Navy reports the sinking of a fleet-tug off the coast of Korea. The Washington announcement says the 1600 ton U.S.S. Sarcel hit a mine Wednesday afternoon and went down 16 minutes later. Two crewmen were killed; three are missing and four others are seriously injured. Eighty-eight officers and men from the tug were rescued from the water by the minesweeper Zeal and the destroyer Boyd.
