## EISENHOWER DUE HOME.

## TO SPEAK AT ABILENE

GENERAL DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER,
LESS THAN FOUR DAYS AWAY FROM
CIVILIAN LIFE, TOLD HIS FINAL NEWS
CONFERENCE IN PARIS YESTERDAY, THAT
HE WILL TAKE OFF HIS ARMY UNIFORM
TUESDAY NIGHT AFTER HE COMPLETES
TWO DAYS OF MILITARY REPORTS IN
WASHINGTON. THEN, HE SAID, HE WILL
BE ABLE TO TAKE UP THE "NORMAL
PRIVILEGES OF AN AMERICAN CITIZEN."
HE EXPLAINED THAT HE IS ONLY DROPPING HIS ACTIVE STATUS AS A FIVE
STAR GENERAL AND WAS NOT RESIGNING
FROM THE ARMY. HE ADDED THAT IF HE
RECEIVES THE REPUBLICAN NOMINATION
HE WILL SUBMIT HIS RESINATION TO
THE PRESIDENT.

GENERAL EISENHOWER WILL MAKE HIS FIRST SPEECH IN THE UNITED STATES SINCE HE BECAME AVAILABLE FOR THE PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION AT ABILENE, KANSAS, EARLY NEXT WEEK.

## REDS RIOT IN JAPAN

WILD RED RIOTS FLARED THROUGHOUT JAPAN FRIDAY NIGHT, RESULTING
IN THE DEATH OF ONE RIOTER AND INJURIES TO MORE THAN 100 OTHERS.
POLICE HAVE ARRESTED MORE THAN 140.
THE CITIES OF TOKYO, NAGOYA, OSAKA
AND KOBE WERE THE SITES OF THE MAJOR DEMONSTRATIONS WITH MORE THAN
TEN THOUSAND JAPANESE AND KOREANS
TAKING PART. THE FOCAL POINT OF
THE VIOLENCE WAS TOKYO, WHERE ACCOMDING TO POLICE, MORE THAN EIGHT
THOUSAND FIOTED. MOST OF THE ACTION
TOOK PLACE IN THE SUBURBS.

## PANMUNJOM BULLETIN

Troy Ruttman, 22-year-old speed demon from Linwood, Calif., won the 500mile Memorial Day race at Indianapolis
Speedway in the fastest auto race in
history. Ruttman earned his race victory
at the expense of Vukovitch who had paced the race from the early stages.

Vukovitch, leading with just eight laps to go, crashed his high-speed racer into the horthwest retaining wall while going batter than 130 mph. He was not hurt. He walked away from the wrock. Ruttmen was just 26 seconds behind when Vukovitch creshed.

The fastest race was over in four hours. Ruttman's average speed for the entire course was 128.222, nearly two and a half miles per hour faster than last year's mark. 20 of the original field of 33 pers were still in the race at the end. Behind Ruttman was Rathman in second place and Sam Hanks in third.
