CORDOVA PURSUES REDS INTO OWN GROUNDS

THE AIR WAS DAMP AND CHILLY. RAIN FROM THE PREVIOUS DAY LEFT THE GROUND WET AND SOGGY. A DENSE BLANKET OF FOG HOVERED OVER THE VALLEY. "KING" COMPANY MOVED OUT AT DAWN TOWARD THEIR DESTINATION, AN ENEMY OUTPOST.

1ST LT MARK J. HANNA LED THE 3RD PLATOON UP A FINGER TOWARD AN ENEMY PERSONNEL BUNKER WHICH WAS THE PLATOON'S PRIMARY OBJECTIVE. NEARING THE CREST OF THE HILL, CPL LAWRENCE CORDOVA ADVANCED WITH THE ASSAULT SQUAD, ATTEMPTING A SNEAK ATTACK ON THE ENEMY POSITION.

CORDOVA, ARMED WITH SIX WHITE PHOSPHOROUS AND SIX FRAGMENTATION GRENADES, EDGED HIS WAY OVER THE PEAK AND SPOTTED 35 TO 40 CHINESE IN THE VICINITY OF THE BUNKER. HE IMMEDIATELY JUMPED TO HIS FEET AND HURLED GRENADE AFTER GRENADE INTO THE EMPLACEMENT.

THE ENEMY OPENED UP WITH SMALL ARMS AND AUTOMATIC WEAPONS FIRE BUT CORDOVA WOULD NOT LET UP. HIS SUPPLY OF GRENADES WAS SOON EXHAUSTED BUT WAS REPLENISHED BY A NEARBY GRENADE. WHEN THESE WERE GONE, THE "BUFFALO" CORPORAL EMPTIED HIS CARBINE INTO THE ENEMY POSITION AND THEN GRABBED AN AUTOMATIC RIFLE.

CORPORAL CORDOVA MOVED IN CLOSER TO THE ENEMY BUNKER FIRING AS HE WENT AND DUCKING ENEMY FRAG AND CONCUSSION GRENADES BEING THROWN AT HIM. LIEUTENANT HANNA ORDERED CORDOVA TO DISCONTINUE HIS ASSAULT.

"BUT I CAN GET RIGHT IN THERE WITH THEM," HE SAID AND DISCOURAGINGLY RETURNED TO THE GROUP.

CORDOVA WAS ASSISTANT ASSAULT SQUAD LEADER AND HIS CONSPICUOUS DISPLAY OF COURAGE AND LEADERSHIP KEPT THE MEN WITH HIM COORDINATED AND GAVE THEM INCENTIVE TO FOLLOW HIS FEARLESS LEAD. (CONTINUED ON PAGE 2, COLUMN 1)

SENATE PASSES GI BILL

THE SENATE HAS PASSED THE GI BILL OF RIGHTS FOR KOREAN VETERANS. THE BILL WILL NOW BE SENT TO A CONFERENCE WITH THE HOUSE WHICH HAS ALREADY PASSED SIMILAR LEGISLATION. NO DIFFICULTY IS EXPECTED IN REACHING AGREEMENT ON A COMPROMISE MEASURE.

THE SENATE VERSION OF THE BILL PROVIDES FOR COLLEGE, AS WELL AS ON THE FARM AND ON THE JOB TRAINING FOR KOREAN VETERANS.

THE ONE MAJOR DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THIS BILL AND THE ONE PASSED FOR WORLD WAR II VETERANS IS THAT TUITION AND FEES WILL BE PAID DIRECTLY TO THE VETERAN INSTEAD OF TO THE SCHOOLS.

THE FEELING ON TUITION IS PAYMENT OF UP TO \$360 A YEAR. SUBSISTENCE PAYMENTS ARE LIMITED TO \$80 A MONTH FOR SINGLE VETERANS. VETS WITH TWO DEPENDENTS GET \$130 A MONTH.

UNITED NATIONS INFANTRYMEN SATURDAY NIGHT AND SUNDAY MORNING BEAT OFF TWO STRONG RED ATTACKS ON NEWLY WON HILL POSITIONS WEST OF CHORWON. THE ALLIES CLIPPED A COMMUNIST ASSAULT ON "BALDY", A BARRON MOUND THAT HAS BEEN TURNED INTO A MASS OF MUD BY A TORRENT OF RAIN. ONE ATTACK WAS LAUNCHED BY 750 REDS WITH TANK-FIRE SUPPORT. 30 MINUTES AFTER THE INITIAL THRUST, THE COMMUNISTS LIMPED BACK TO THEIR LINES.

UN SOLDIERS CLAWED THROUGH THE RAIN-MUD ON ROUTINE PATROLS ON THE EASTERN FRONT, BUT FAILED TO MAKE CONTACT WITH THE REDS.

AMERICAN THUNDERJETS COMPLETED ONE OF THEIR MOST SUCCESSFUL DAYLIGHT STRIKES BY OBLITERATING 150 RED SUPPLY TRUCKS IN A SURPRISE RAID SOUTH OF WONSON.

THE ARMISTICE TALKS ARE STILL RECESSED, BUT BOTH SIDES HANDED THE OTHER NOTES SATURDAY. THE REDS CLAIM THE ALLIES HAVE CALLED FOR THE RECESS TO DELAY THE WAR.

MARINE BILL SIGNED

PRESIDENT TRUMAN HAS SIGNED A BILL GIVING THE COMMANDANT OF THE MARINE CORPS A PART TIME VOICE ON THE JOINT CHIEFS OF STAFF. THE BILL ALSO PROVIDES FOR INCREASING THE STRENGTH OF THE CORPS TO 432,000 MEN.
