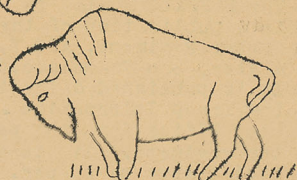
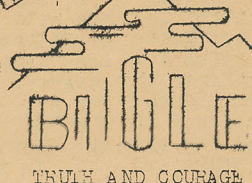
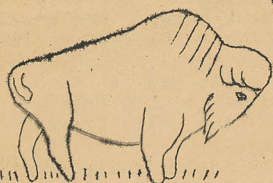

## TRUCE TALKS RESUME REMAIN UNDER WRAPS

The climatic meeting of the nearly two year old armistice negotiations opened in Panmunjom at 11 a.m. yesterday morning to hear a Communist answer that would mean an early cease fire or the complete collapse of the truce talks.

Yesterday's meeting, ending a nine day recess, remained under secrecy wraps.

## KOREANS BATTLE KOREANS

Koreans bottled Koreans Wednesday in close quarter fighting for a narrow key strip in front of "Luke the Gook's Castle" on the eastern front.

North Korean Reds, picked off the finger tip ridge early Wednesday in bitter hand to hand combat with counter attacking South Korean ROKs hurled their own counter attack in the forenoon.

In the air, Fifth Air Force fighter-bombers flew 52 bombing and strafing sorties against the Reds in Luke the Gook's area. 70 more fighter-bombers dumped tons of high explosives on Chinese Reds holding the lost Allied outpost of Carson, Elko and Vegas on the western front. No Russian built MIGs were seen in the air.

Nearly 900 Army and Air Force dependents will be flown to Japan this month by a special air lift project that began yesterday in San Francisco. Passengers will be chosen on the basis of the current priority list from those families who accepted air travel to Japan. The air lift is a temporary measure to relieve the current back log in independent shipping.

## WHITE BN. OPENS COMMO SCHOOL

Head-Quarters Company of the 2nd Battalion, 17th Infantry "Buffalo" Regiment, is currently conducting a school designed to train replacements for rotating communications personnel and teach basic communications subjects to infantrymen.

The three day school offers instruction on operation and maintenance of portable radio and phone sets, radio and telephone procedure, setting up a communications wire net and care and maintenance of all wire communications equipment.

Master Sergeant Nosh Hayden, school supervisor and battalion commo chief, expects at least eight 3--man classes to graduate from the course. "Ten men---both infantrymen and commo personnel---from three companies make up each class," said Sergeant Hayden. "The six instructors are competent and each is a specialist in the field he teaches."

According to 1st Lt. Kenneth Swift, 2nd Battalion assistant operations officer, the three day course has a dual purpose. "It will serve to prepare men to replace rottees and teach the average soldier the fundamentals of communications work," said Lieutenant Swift.

Raymond Rodriguez, starting and losing BUFFALO hurler, walked three men and these, coupled with three errors and the single, were good for six Divarty tallies. Marvin Hill was called in to relieve Rodriguez, and he succeeded in quelling the uprising and went on to chuck good ball for the remainder of the contest.

The Artillery nine scored single runs in the third and fifth innings. The other BUFFS' tally scored in the sixth frame on a couple of walks and a pair of in-field outs.

The only BUFFALOBS to touch Barad for softies were Jim Lhuillier in the seventh inning, and Paul Bananno in the eighth. Brad's performance is probably the best turned in this season in the league.
