

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## IN KOREA

Allied and Communist armistice negotiators returned to the conference hut after a one day recess. The meeting was scheduled to begin at 11 a.m. Saturday. The talks were in secret. The Allies submitted a plan to settle the prisoner exchange issue Thursday during an hour and 15 minute session. The United Nations then called the recess.

The South Korean government has shown a reluctance to accept a truce. But after a conference with Gen. Mark Clark in Seoul yesterday, South Korean president Syngman Rhee said, "We would accept almost any proposal the United States asks of us, because the United States is the only friendly nation which has done so much for us in the past and who will do much more for us in the future." Rhee made the statement in a recorded interview broadcast to the United States. But, Rhee said his acceptance of the armistice terms was made under protest and was, as he put it, "can't amount to acceptance of a death warrant."

In an earlier press interview, Rhee said the only hope for Korea is to let the South Koreans fight it out with the Communists.

American Sabre jet pilots had a field day in the Korean fighting Friday. Sabre pilots shot down eight Communist MiGs, probably destroyed another and damaged five.

While the Sabres dueled with MiGs far to the North, Fifth Air Force fighter-bombers and light-bombers slammed tons of high explosives into Red frontline fortifications.

On the ground, South Korean soldiers of the 15th Division fought hand-to-hand for hours with North Korean Reds.

## "MUSICAL MADCAPS"

Eddie La Rue made Arthur Godfrey look like an amateur on the uke as he strummed "Stars And Stripes Forever," and made an inexpensive ukulele sound like a celeste in Rhee's "Music Box."

Doris Lee was the hit of the show, if the popping of flash bulbs is any indication. Wearing a shimmering blue and silver-sequin dress, she seemed completely at ease as she sang "I've Got The World On A String," charmingly, and followed that with "Sunny Side Of The Street." Her last song brought on the rest of the cast, and closed the show with the audience clamoring for more.
