## U.S. ACCEPTS TERMS

President Eisenhower revealed yesterday that the Reds latest proposal for a Korean truce is acceptable to the U.S. He told South Korea bluntly that the United Nations would not be justified in prolonging the war to force unification of Korea. Mr. Eisenhower urgently appealed to President Syngman Rhee to accept the truce terms.

Meanwhile, President Rhee yesterday threw his full support behind U.S. government forces resisting an armistice.

## PANMUNJOM BULLETIN

American and Communist staff officers completed in 37 minutes yesterday morning their work on administrative details of the prisoner of war exchange agreement. There was no official disclosure of their decisions. The main truce delegations met at 11 a.m. for the fifth secret session. The Communists requested a brief recess shortly after the talks began. After it expired, the Reds asked that it be extended for an additional 10 minutes. When the delegates reconvened, they talked for 25 minutes—then recessed for lunch at 11:26 a.m. There was to be an afternoon session, but the time was not announced.

A Communist jet fighter was shot down by an American night fighter near the Yalu River last night when it attempted to break into a formation of Allied Superforts blasting a huge supply center deep in Northwest Korea.

Heavy rains slowed ground fighting all along the front, including the long and bitter fight at Luke's Castle.

## KATUSA DRIVING CLASS

Three imaginative 17th Infantry "Buffaloes" have initiated a driver training school for KATUSA personnel of Regimental Headquarters Company. Six Koreans are currently enrolled with more pupils expected soon.

The novel idea, contributed by SFC David Scarberry, Intelligence & Reconnaissance Platoon sergeant, is being put into practice by L/Sgt. Edward Dameron, motor pool sergeant, and Cpl. Jack D'Andre, I&R squad leader.

The KATUSAs not only are taught to drive, said D'Andre, but also receive instruction on preventative maintenance, care of vehicles and filling out trip tickets correctly. Represented in the six man class are the Buffalo motor pool, I&R and Anti-tank & Mine Platoons.

Although D'Andre must use an interpreter to make himself understood, he is very enthusiastic about his pupils. "I've got them in second gear already," he boasted after their first class period.

## LATE NEWS

At yesterday afternoon's armistice meeting at Panmunjom the negotiators agreed on the disposition of prisoners of war who refuse to return to their countries. The signing of this clause brings us one step closer to an all-out armistice.

### STRATOJET'S BREAK RECORD

Three American B-47 Stratojet bombers smashed the United States to England speed record yesterday by flashing across the Atlantic in slightly over five and one half hours.
