## PANMUNJOM BULLETIN

Truce negotiators met in secret for 12 minutes Tuesday morning at Panmunjom to continue work on an agreement to end the shooting in Korea. Adjournment was by mutual agreement and another session is scheduled for 11 a.m. today. Still to be settled are certain administrative matters. Staff officers of both sides all ready have started work on new sets of military maps pinpointing Allied and Communist positions along the 155 mile front. South Korean and Communist soldiers are complicating the matter by debating it with bullets and shells on the eastern front. ROK troops this morning were pressing an attack to regain positions lost in a Red push 14 days ago.

## RHEE SAYS CONTINUE

South Korean government leaders voted Monday to continue the war despite any armistice and President Syngman Rhee vowed that the Korean people will pay no attention to the truce.

Thousands of Koreans demonstrated against a truce with Communism in Seoul yesterday, supporting their president's pledge to fight on despite any armistice.

## RED PLANES BOMB SEOUL

Red planes bombed Seoul and Allied soldiers patrolled no-mans land Monday night and war-torn Korea awaited an armistice that could come any time.

Early reports from the front indicated last night was quieter than for many weeks.

Fifth Air Force said nine small single-engined planes, moving on Seoul from the direction of Red-held Kaesong, bombed Seoul, its outskirts and the vicinity of an air field near Seoul.

## BUFFALO NICKELS

Inflation has recently made itself felt in the 17th Infantry "Buffalo" Regiment. This sad state of affairs was noted not long ago in the high cost of "Buffalo Nickels." The inflation threat is not serious, but the fact remains that nickels now cost nine cents.

Despite the high cost of nickels, the Buffaloes are going to finance the project through company funds. This will make it possible to continue the custom of a gift and a personal word from the Regimental Commander to each incoming replacement.
