Senete Poreign Relations Chairman Wiley expressed the hope that Rhee's government recognize, the need for unity.



A masterful pitching performance by BUFFALC hurler hervin Hill went down the drain fuesday afternoon as Special Troops edged

the BUFFS, 4-3. The Winners tellied four times in the opening frame, all unsarmed as the BUFFA-LO defense behind Hill collapsed.

A Walk, four BUFFALO errors and a single produced four runs for the Special Troops in the first inning, and that was the ball game.

In the bottom of the initial from the BUTFS tallied twice on a trio of walks, an error and a single. Lou Domenico opened the game for the 17th by getting a base on balls. A single through the box into center field by player-manger Rod Lozano moved Domenico to second, and a pass to Paul Bananno loaded the sacks with none out. However, in the bottom of the inning the BUFFS scored the last run of the contest on a pair of singles and two walks. Bunch and Rodman singled with one out. After Corrick was retired, both Jim L'huillier and Merco Pensiero walked to force home Bunch with the third run for the BUFFALOWS. At this point Joe Watts, who caught the first five and two thirds innings for the Special Troops, relieved Faber and got Hill on strikes for the third out.

The lest scoring threat by the BUFFS came in the eighth inning. With two ewey, Bob Corrick blasted a long drive into left-center field, good for two bases. However, Duene Henning, running for Corrick, was out when he attempted to take third on a ball that momentarily got away from the catcher.

Hill, making his third start of the season, retired the Troops in order in five of the last six innings. The big southpay struck out 10 and scattered five singles, but all in a losing cause.
