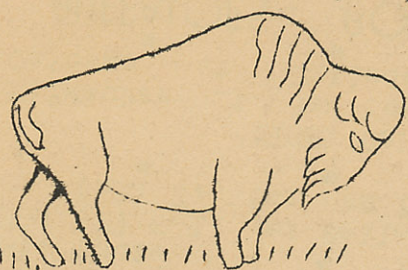
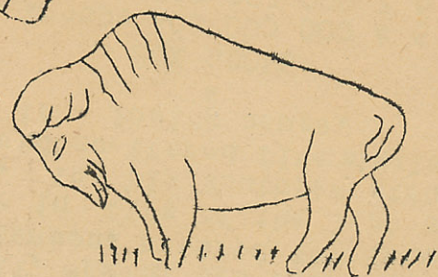

Truce delegates met for 23 minutes Wednesday morning and then took an indefinite recess while waiting for staff officers to clear up the unsettled details blocking an armistice.

The UN command announced that the indefinite recess of the plenary delegates was taken pending administrative staff work on the part of the staff officer groups.

The UN announcement said either side could call the delegates back into session.

Shortly after the plenary session recessed the staff officers began their meeting. Like the plenary session it was conducted in secret.

Map experts from both sides yesterday were pinpointing the cease fire line and a two and one-half mile wide buffer line along the 155-mile battlefield. The military line of demarcation is among the most important of the several administrative details to be ironed out before the negotiators can reach agreement.

Meanwhile, on the battlefield South Korean foot soldiers fought to the crest of Luke's Castle on Korea's eastern front Tuesday night in a desperate attempt to win the vital peak for UN officers mapping the new line.

Secretary of Defense Wilson says it will be six months or more before any U.S. troops can begin moving out to Korea if an armistice is reached.

Wilson made the statement while testifying before a Senate appropriations sub-committee on his plan for Air Force spending.

Other officials, including President Eisenhower, have said U.S. troops would have to remain there (Korea) for some time but have mentioned no specific period.

The United States may be the "melting pot of the world;" but the 2nd Battalion, 17th Infantry "Buffalo" Regiment, claims to be its military counterpart.

According to M/Sgt. Adrian Castillo, battalion sergeant major, a recent shipment of replacements included; two Japanese, two Hawaiians, a Chinese, a Lebanese, an Italian and a former resident of Guam Island.

Other nationalities represented in the Buffalo unit are: Puerto Ricans, Philipinos, Scottish, Hungarians, English, Koreans, Greeks, Belgians and Germans.

Sergeant Castillo has not yet decided where to classify the several American Indians in the 2nd Battalion.

### LATE NEWS FLASH

Republican and Democratic senators declared it would be tragic if South Korean President Syngman Rhee blocks a truce in the Korea war.

Senate Foreign Relations Chairman Wiley expressed the hope that Rhee's government would recognize the need for unity.

In Seoul, meantime, the South Korean government information director yesterday denied as completely unfounded reports that President Rhee would fly to Washington to make a final plea to President Eisenhower to halt conclusion of a truce.

## BUFFALOES BOW, 4-3

A masterful pitching performance by BUFFALO hurler Mervin Hill went down the drain Tuesday afternoon as Special Troops edged

the BUFFS, 4-3. The winners tallied four times in the opening frame, all unearned as the BUFFALO defense behind Hill collapsed.

A walk, four BUFFALO errors and a single produced four runs for the Special Troops in the first inning, and that was the ball game.

In the bottom of the initial frame the BUFFS tallied twice on a trio of walks, an error and a single. Lou Domenico opened the game for the 17th by getting a base on balls. A single through the box into center field by player-manager Rod Lozano moved Domenico to second, and a pass to Paul Bananno loaded the sacks with none out. Rudy Bunch popped up for the first out, but John Rodman reached first on a fielder's choice with Domenico scoring from third base. On the same play fleet-footed Lozano dashed around third and scored as the catcher dropped the throw to the plate in attempting to tag Lozano. Bob Corrick walked, but the rally died as Corrick was nipped trying to steal second.

Both Hill and the Troops' starting hurler, Ed Faber, settled down to pitch scoreless ball until the sixth inning. However, in the bottom of the inning the BUFFS scored the last run of the contest on a pair of singles and two walks. Bunch and Rodman singled with one out. After Corrick was retired, both Jim L'huillier and Marco Pensiero walked to force home Bunch with the third run for the BUFFALOES. At this point Joe Watts, who caught the first five and two thirds innings for the Special Troops, relieved Faber and got Hill on strikes for the third out.

The last scoring threat by the BUFFS came in the eighth inning. With two away, Bob Corrick blasted a long drive into left-center field, good for two bases. However, Duane Henning, running for Corrick, was out when he attempted to take third on a ball that momentarily got away from the catcher.

Hill, making his third start of the season, retired the Troops in order in five of the last six innings. The big southpaw struck out 10 and scattered five singles, but all in a losing cause.
