RED ATTACK CRUSHED

Withering Allied shell fire and bullets inflicted an estimated 115 casualties on two forces of Chinese Reds probing outpost Harry early yesterday.

UN big guns and mortars backed up the small arms fire of their troops when an enemy company was spotted moving toward the base of the hill at 3 a.m. The Reds suffered an estimated 90 killed and wounded and the force was dispersed before it reached the base of the hill. Allied tanks east of the outpost caught a force of 100 Chinese Reds attempting a flanking thrust. Tank gunners opened up and drove the Reds back with an estimated 25 casualties.

Eighth Army Commander Lt. Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor congratulated the men who had stuck to their guns through it all. "I have noticed with pride the staunch defensive and offensive action conducted by the 3rd Infantry Division. I extend my most sincere congratulations."

Top truce negotiators are still in recess as staff officers grapple with technical problems standing in the way of a cease fire agreement. The UN and Communist staff groups met as scheduled at 11 o'clock Sunday morning.

Yon Jeung Kim, head of the Korean affairs institute at Washington, has cabled South Korean President Syngman Rhee, urging him to accept the terms of the Korean war armistice.

"I feel as strongly about the unification of Korea as you do, but I believe it can best be done peacefully," the cable to Rhee said. "Continuing or intensifying the war will mean the extermination of our nation. Your first duty, therefore, is to save our people."

BACK AGAIN

The good impression the 17th Infantry "Buffalo" Regiment made on Sgt. Leonard Phillips, when he was attached to the unit in Alaska during the last war, brought him back to the regiment ten years later and a continent away.

In 1943, Sgt. Phillips was attached to the Buffaloes as an engineer, while the outfit was stationed in the Aleutian chain of islands. During the three months he served with the regiment, he took part in the invasion of Attu Island.

Later, he was sent to Europe, and finally, just recently, arrived over here. When he found out that the Buffaloes were over here, Sgt. Phillips requested to rejoin the unit. Now he's Commo Chief for the Buffalo Heavy Mortar Company. He says that he's glad to be back, but notices a lot of changes in the ten years he has been away.

The lanky sergeant says, "the biggest differences are in the mortars and the radios. A lot of new designs have been put into the field since 1943. The big change in the radios," he went on, "is the ease of handling and operating." Sgt. Phillips also noted that radios were more effective and have better range now.

Sgt. Phillips concluded, "the Army men of today has a much better deal than the men in the last war; the chow, the PX, and the pay are all improved. Just about everything the Army men used to gripe about is better than it ever was when I first got in."

Eight BUFFALO errors permitted seven unearned runs to cross the plate for the Buccaneers Saturday afternoon, and gave the Bucs an 11-7 victory over the BUFFS. It was the second victory for the Buccaneers over the BUFFALOES this season as they buried the BUFFS under a barrage of 13 hits.

The BUFFALOES momentarily had the lead in the first inning, but saw it vanish for good when the Bucs tallied three runs in the bottom of the opening frame. BUFFALO leadoff man, Lou Domenico, singled to center and advanced to second base as Rod Lozano beat out a bunt. A walk to Paul Bonanno loaded the sacks with no outs. In the sixth the BUFFS tallied a lone tally on singles by L'hillier and Marco "RA" Pensiero. Eight men went to the plate in the eighth inning as the BUFFALOES scored three runs. The big blow of the frame was a homer by center fielder L'huillier. On Rudy Bunch's second double and Rodman's single, the BUFFS scored their last run in the top of the ninth inning.
