### R&R TEMPORARILY HALTED FOR EIGHTH ARMY TROOPS

Eighth Army Headquarters announced that rest and recuperation leaves for Eighth Army troops were suspended temporarily yesterday, while aircraft normally used in carrying troops between Korea and Japan diverted to front line operational missions. Col. Russel T. Finn, acting Deputy Chief of Staff for administration, stated he was unable to determine at this time for what period the suspension would continue.

### TWO PRISON BREAKS BY NORTH KOREANS

Two new prison breaks freed more than 1400 anti-Communist prisoners-of-war last night to join the 25,000 freed yesterday by Rhee's order.

The two new breaks were at Yongchon and Ascom City.

American Marines and soldiers, who replaced South Korean guards at Ascom City, killed at least 30 escaping prisoners and wounded 93 others. The prisoners at Yongchon overran South Korean guards to get away.

Korea's obedient millions immediately swallowed up most of the released prisoners.
