PANMUNJOM BULLETIN

Allied Communist truce negotiators held a 25-minute session at Panmunjom Saturday morning and then recessed indefinitely at the request of the Communists. The meeting was secret and there was no official release of what went on inside the conference hut. The Communists had requested the meeting. It was recessed at 11:25 a.m. With the provisions still holding that either side may call for the resumption of the talks.

* * * * * POWs ESCAPE

An American guard was wounded and a POW guard killed Saturday night by automatic weapons fire from the hills out side POW camp No 2 near Sangju.

The shooting threw the camp into a turmoil and 24 anti-Communist POW's took advantage of the confusion, escaped shortly after dawn this morning. Four of the prisoners were recaptured.

Twelve escapes were also made from prison camp No. 5 at Sangju. Five of them were recaptured. One fled from camp 4-A at Isenju.

ATOM SPIES DIE IN ELECTRIC CHAIR

Atom spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg died in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison yesterday. Julius was the first to die. He was placed in the chair at 9:04 a.m., Japan standard time and pronounced dead 2:45 seconds later.

Ethel Rosenberg followed. She was placed in the chair approximately 9:12 a.m. and pronounced dead 4:30 seconds later.

The Rosenbergs were convicted in March, 1951, of conspiring to violate the 1917 espionage act by giving the Soviet Union "sketches" and other information on America's atomic bomb.

The husband and wife team died for a crime that could have monstrous consequences. President Eisenhower said only a few hours after they died that their terrible sentence may bring death to tens of millions of innocent persons.

Their crime, the President said, had changed the course of history and pushed the world closer to atomic war.

The trial judge who sentenced the Rosenbergs said their theft of atomic secrets helped to bring about the Communists attack on South Korea. He said their crime was "worse than murder."
