SABRES KO 6 MIGS

Sabre jets blasted six Communist MIGs out of North Korean skies Monday while the Allied ground Army set out another quiet day.

Sabre pilots scored against the Red jets after two days of bad weather grounded most Allied planes.

The U.S. jets also damaged two other MIGs.

South Koreans of the Eighth ROK Division won back a dominant hill on Finger Ridge.

Allied fighterbombers and B-26 bombers destroyed four rail bridges north of the key western front Monday Fifth Air Force said.

D.C. SECRET MESSAGE ENROUTE TO RHEE

Assistant Secretary of State Walter S. Robertson left for Korea yesterday with a secret message from President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles to Syngman Rhee on the Armistice the South Korean leader has jeopardized.

Gen. J. Lawton Collins, Army Chief of Staff, joined Robertson on the trip at the last minute.

Robertson's departure came as the United States sought to repair the harm done to truce chances by Rhee's unauthorized release of thousands of Communist prisoners.

SHARP SHOOTERS

June 18-21 the BUFFALO Regiment held its much publicized pistol matches with each company in the regiment sending their top five sharp-shooters to Service Company where the matches were staged.

The end results showed that the competition was keen throughout the three-day matches. At battalion level only 21 points separated the winning 1st Battalion from the fourth place Columbians. Red Battalion topped the regiment with a score of 1358 out of a possible 1700. Points were computed on a 10 for a bull etc. Close behind was the 2nd Battalion team with 1354, the 3rd Battalion with a total of 1339, and the South American unit with a 1337 mark. The above scores were a total of the five top men in each battalion.

A further breakdown to company level placed "Dog" Company at the top with a mark of 1290, 161 points better than runnerup "Love" Company. Heavy Mortar was a close third with 1118.

Individual honors went to M/Sgt. James K. Wilson of Dog Company. Sergeant Wilson scored a 334 out of a possible 350 to top his closest rival, PFC Kendall Middleton of "Mike" Company, by 29 points. Only three points separated the following trio: WO2G Theodore Roberson, also of Dog Company, hit for a 302 mark; (continued on page #2 column #2)

The above five Buffaloes had the highest score among the 15 men who survived the stiff competition over the past week. By the end of the month the field will be narrowed down to five men and two alternates who will represent the regiment at Division during the first 15 days in July.
