Leadership School takes care of 100 men during a five and 1/2 day training schedule. The break down on this number of men is five from each unit in the regiment. The majority of the men who attend this school are men who have served a tour of duty on the front line. It is for this reason that the school has been established. Lt. Devereaux, Commanding Officer of the school, said that the main emphasis of the school is placed on the fact that the men are still soldiers, even though they have experienced combat. He went on to say that the school's enrollment is made up of men with the rank of E-2, E-3 and E-4.

For a more technical aspect of the instruction that is carried on in the school, each special unit supplies the teaching of such things as: Commo training, Engineer training, Tankers instruction and Heavy Mortar operations plus others.

The school has made a "good name for itself" in the regiment and is fully recognized by each unit commander. The men, upon graduation, are considered, in their respective units, as "potential NCOs."

A look at the day's training schedule shows, reveille at 0545, PT to 0615, chow served to 0645, inspection from 0730 to 0800 and the first class starting at 0800 and ending at 1130. In the afternoon classes start at 1300 and continue to 1630. During the evenings the men have night problems.

The employment of the practical side of education will not only help to enable the men to perform under adverse conditions, whenever the need exists, but has also helped to make the men proficient and capable of an NCO rating.
