The school has made a "good name for itself" in the regiment and is fully recognized by each unit commander. The men, upon graduation, are considered, in their respective units, as "potential NCOs."

A look at the day's training schedule shows, reville at 0545, PT to 0615, chow served to 0645, inspection from 0730 to 0800 and the first class starting at 0800 and snding at 1130. In the afternoon classes start at 1300 and continue to 1630. During the evenings the men have night problems.
