ROKs HIT HARD

Two reinforced Chinese companies clung to the crest of vital Lookout Mountain yesterday morning after driving ROK defenders back to the southern slope late Saturday.

The hard pressed 3rd ROK Division took the greatest artillery and mortar pounding in any one day of the entire three years of war in Korea. By 6:00 P.M. Saturday a total of 81,052 shells had fallen on 3rd Division positions along the Kunsam and Putak Rivers.

The Communist also set eight mortar and artillery records across the entire front, dropping 130,690 shells during the 24 hour period, almost all of it on South Korean positions.

Presidential envoy Walter Robertson conferred with President Syngman Rhee in secret for nearly an hour yesterday. After the meeting he told newsmen, "I have confidence we can reach a mutual agreement and clear up misunderstandings that may exist between us."

Robertson said he called on Rhee this morning to "clear up a detail." The envoy said "the negotiations are still continuing." Robertson told newsmen his scheduled flying tour of the battle-front yesterday has been cancelled entirely.
