RED CAPTURE OUTPOST QUEEN

Chinese Reds have struck a hard blow at Allied positions on the western front in Korea.

A 4,500 man Red assault force over ran a vital outpost guarding the Chorwon invasion route to Seoul. The Red troops moved toward the main Allied line.

One Red battalion swept to the top of outpost Queen-- a key UN forward position in the sector.

Red soldiers also recaptured outpost Bak in the same area-- near the Imjin River.

Rain and heavy clouds held Fifth Air Force warplanes to only 44 close support missions along the battleline during

Monday was the fourth day of secret talks in Seoul between South Korean President Syngman Rhee and U.S. truce envoy Walter Robertson. They are still trying to iron out disputes blocking Allied accord on the long sought armistice. Although no definite meeting had been scheduled for Monday, Robertson said Sunday, "the negotiations are still continuing."

All meetings are held in secret, but both men seemed optimistic Sunday.

COLONEL TORRES NEW COLOMBIAN C.O.

Saturday morning the Colombian Battalion was the scene of a colorful ceremony in honor of a change in command. Lt. Col. Carlos Ortiz Torres accepted command of the battalion from Lt. Col. Alberto Ruiz Novoa, who is rotating home.

At 1030 hours the battalion formed an Honor Guard for the presentation of awards by Colonel Ruiz. A trumpet sounded to advance the colors, and with the chorus used shout of "Viva Colombia," the colorful ceremony began.

Colonel Ruiz presented scores of awards to the officers and men of the unit for bravery and good conduct. Some 10 Koreans, who have been with the Colombians over two years, received Colombian Good Conduct Medals. Many of the men present received diplomas to signify their promotion to Corporal and Sergeant.

Colonel Ruiz spoke to the men, thanking them for their fine job in completing their assignments, and praising them as men and soldiers. He concluded by saying that he knew the men would show Colonel Ortiz the same respect and devotion they had shown him.
